Gale will not be placed in an assignment which will give him unsupervised access to children under the age of eighteen (18) years old, including parish hereby remises, releases and assignments, forever discharges the Roman Catholic Archbishop of Boston, a Corporation Sole, its agents , scrvants, officers, employees and independent contractors, all priests incardinated to the Roman Catholic Archdiocese of Boston, including, but not limited to Reverend Robert V. Gale, and all entities and organizations affiliated with or associated with the Roman Catholic Archbishop of Boston, a Corporation Sole, their agents, servants, employees, officers, trustees, directors and independent contractors, of and from all debts, demands, causes of action, suits, accounts, covenants, contracts, agreements, damages, and any and all claims, demands and liabilities whatsoever of every name and nature, both in LAW and in EQUITY, including, without limitation, any and all claims for past, present or future physical, mental and emotional injuries, whether presently known or unknown, any and all claims for punitive or exemplary damages, any and all claims for loss of earning capacity, diminished life expectancy, death, loss of consortium, loss of society, physical and mental anguish, infliction of emotional distress, pain and suffering, legal fees and expenses, any and all claims for violations of Massachusetts General Laws Chapter

93A and Chapter 176D, and any and all liens asserted, or which may hereafter be asserted, known or unknown, as a result of any claim herein released, which against the said Roman Catholic Archbishop of Boston, a Corporation Sole, its agents, servants, officers, employees and independent contractors, all priests incardinated to the Roman Catholic Archdiocese of Boston, including, but not limited to Reverend Robert V. Gale, and all entities and organizations affiliated with or associated with the Roman Catholic Archbishop of Boston, a Corporation Sole, their agents, servants, employees, officers, directors and independent contractors, I now have or ever had from the beginning of the world to this date, including but in no way limited to events which occurred in February of 1979.

I further agree that this settlement is in full compromise of a doubtful and disputed claim both as to the question of liability and as to the nature, extent and permanency of all injuries and damages, and that the payment is not to be construed as an admission of liability on the part of the Roman Catholic Archbishop of Boston, a Corporation Sole, its agents, servants, officers, employees and independent contractors, all priests incardinated to the Roman Catholic Archbiocese of Boston, including, but not limited to Reverend Robert V. Gale, and all entities and organizations affiliated with or associated with the Roman Catholic Archbishop of Boston, a Corporation Sole, their agents, servants, employees, officers, directors and independent contractors, all of whom expressly

deny liability. No promise or inducement which is not herein expressed has been made to me and in executing this Release, I do not rely upon any statement or representation made by any person, firm or corporation hereby released, or any agent or other person representing them or any other concerning the nature, extent, or duration of said damages or losses, or the legal liability therefore.

It further is expressly agreed by and among all of the parties to this Release, as well as their attorneys, agents, servants, employees and insurers, that they will maintain the confidentiality of the facts of this settlement and the specific terms thereof. No party, nor a party's attorney, agent, servant, employee or insurer, shall disclose or cause to be disclosed, directly or indirectly, to any person, corporation or entity not a party to this Release, including but not limited to any form of print or broadcast media, the names of any parties described herein, the existence of any claims against the released parties, the fact of this settlement, the terms or amounts of this settlement, any facts or circumstances leading to the completion of this settlement or the alleged facts and circumstances giving rise to any claims described herein unless in response to a lawfully issued subpoena from a duly constituted Grand Jury or by court order. Prior to making any such required disclosure, through his Counsel, shall notify Counsel for the Roman Catholic Archbishop of Boston, a Corporation Sole, and Counsel for Reverend Robert V.

Gale. This paragraph shall not prevent disclosing or discussing the facts and circumstances giving rise to any claims described herein or the terms of this Settlement Agreement with a licensed clergy, physician, attorney, mental health professional, spouse or partner, or immediate family. Prior to making any disclosures to any of the above named shall inform said person of the persons, confidentiality requirements of this clause and shall obtain from them their agreement to honor such confidentiality.

initially met with Fr. Charles Higgins who in turn referred him to CEM. Fr. Higgins described as a very well balanced twenty-six year old father of two. is employed at the aving taught for a few years. His mother has been a for several years; his father is or was a n. He has shared with his wife what happened to him at the age of twelve.

incident and more recently the Cardinal's letter moved him to unburden his own incident with Fr. Robert Gale while the priest was stationed at St. Joseph's, Quincy Point. He began by saying that it was known that Fr. Gale had approached a kid in the rectory and others, and that the fathers of the boys "ran him out of town". His own father was among them although had not told his parents.

In 1978-79 when was 12 years old, his family had moved ' to North Quincy, but continued to attend St. Joseph's for Mass, was an altar boy who felt Fr. Gale took a special interest in him and who worked with him on a singing part for a later cancelled parish show - all now seen as a set up. During the February, 1979 school vacation week, Fr. Gale invited to go camping at Camp Fatima. They had a hard time getting into one of the buildings and then could not get the heat to work. They then went to Fr. Gale's sister's home. did not know where this was and by this time he was not feeling well and had developed a fever. He remembers that the sister had a room upstairs and that he and Fr. Gale used a pull-out couch in the living room. When he appeared uncomfortable about sharing the bed, Fr. Gale said, "what do you think - that I'm gay?" He is not sure what went on (CEM asked if there were any advances); he knows he was feverish and knows that he felt terrible and that he was bleeding rectally the next morning.

When returned home, he remembers that his mother and a visiting aunt took care of him. He had a 104 fever and they thought the bleeding was connected to the high fever. expressed some bitterness that these adults did not recognize what

thought that they might know, his mother having said at some time, "we know the problems that can happen." He never told them, but did tell two friends. "I trusted no one" and "I went through the motions about church".

feels that in sharing this he will receive support from his family. He felt that his interview provided an opportunity to know that he is not "crazy" and that he is a credible person. Since now lives in Rockland, CEM gave him two counseling agencies on the South Shore as references. She also shared that Fr. Gale's ministry is restricted and that with the permission the incident would be made known to Fr. Gale.

Dear Attorney Rogers:

Thank you for your letter of October 2, 1995. My client, has authorized me to write to you to give a more complete explication or his claim against Reverend Robert V. Gale and the Archdiocese of Boston.

on the South Shore of Massachusetts, was sodomized by Father Gale in Father Gale's sister's apartment in Manchester, New Hampshire in February, 1979. If y grew up in Quincy, Massachusetts and came to know Father Gale at Saint Joseph's Church in Quincy, where my client was an alter boy. My client came to know Father Gale not only through my client's religious duties, but also because of Father Gale's contact with his family. In February 1979, Father Gale invited my client, who was twelve years old at the time, and his brother to go on a camping trip with him to New Hampshire during school vacation. My client's brother got sick, however, and could not attend. At this time, the parents looked favorably upon the fact that Father Gale was taking a special interest in their son.

The circumstances as to what happened in New Hampshire are curious indeed. My client relates that Father Gale drove him to Camp Fatima in Gilmanton, Iron Works, New Hampshire, a camp for mentally retarded and developmentally disabled children owned the Diocese of Manchester, but frequented by Boston clergy. Father Gale apparently did not have any keys to the camp, so he broke into

a cabin with my client. After breaking in, he tried to get heat going, but after a period of time, he decided to go with my client to his sister's apartment in Manchester, New Hampshire.

My client has tracked down, with the assistance of a private investigator, the location of Father Gale's sister's apartment. Indeed, my client was inside the apartment earlier this year and confirms that as being the location where he was sexually molested. My client says that as that day was progressing, he was feeling worse, perhaps coming down with whatever his illness his brother had developed. At Father Gale's sister's apartment, they watched t.v. for a while, and when it was time for bed, Father Gale told my client that they had to sleep together in a pull-out couch. Father Gale stripped down to his t-shirt and underwear and, perhaps sensing that my client was apprehensive, said to him, "Don't worry. What do you think I am, gay?" My client said nothing.

Until one and one-half years ago, that was all my client remembered. Since then, he has remembered that when they were in bed together, Father Gale pulled my client close to him and sodomized him. My client states that his strongest memory was of not being able to move, of feeling mentally and physically paralyzed. In the morning, my client remembers getting dressed and leaving the room in a hurry. His predominant memory of the car ride home is sitting in the front passenger seat and leaning against the door.

When Father Gale brought my client home, his parents put him in bed because he was sick. During the past year, my client has recalled that his parents had suspicions that something had happened to him overnight, because they sent my client's older brother in to ask him if anything had happened. My client denied at that time that anything had happened. My client recalls that his mother checked his underpants and found that they were soiled with blood and a strange liquid. The has recalled that his anus hurt him after the molestation, and he had recurrent hemorrhoid problems for several years thereafter.

As a result of running a personal ad in a newspaper in the Quincy, Massachusetts area, y has been contacted by at least two other victims of Father Gale. One of the victims was sexually molested in New Hampshire as well, within one year after my client's molestation. The other victim was sexually molested by Father Gale shortly before and shortly after he molested this victim is known to the Archdiocese of Boston, and it was his sexual molestation shortly after that led to Father Gale being quickly transferred by the Archdiocese of Boston from Saint Joseph's Church in Quincy to Saint Jude Church in Waltham.

As mentioned before, repressed many of the excrutiatingly painful details of his sexual molestation until late 1993 or early 1994, in the wake of publicity of the Father Porter cases and the request of Cardinal Law in February, 1994 for victims of clergy sexual molestation to come forward.

My client's teenage years were checkered as a result of his sexual molestation. Immediately after the sexual molestation, began drinking alcohol excessively; he specifically recalls coming home one Easter night drunk. also reports that he experienced extremely low self-esteem throughout his teenage years, despite having reason otherwise to feel good about himself due to academic and athletic successes.

credit, he has married, has two children and has established a respectable employment record. However, his external successes cover up his interior condition.

At this time, Managery has authorized me to request that the Archdiocese of Boston make a formal settlement offer to him. Pursuant to your letter of October 2, 1995, we will approach Father Gale directly with respect to civil claims against him. However, I would request receiving a written settlement offer from you on behalf of the Archdioceses of Boston within the next thirty (30) days.

#### **PARTIES**

- 1. Plaintiff, whose date of birth is the last last, and has been at all times pertinent to this action, a resident of the Commonwealth of Massachusetts currently residing in
- 2. Defendant, Reverend Robert V. Gale, is a resident of Milton, Massachusetts.
- 3. Defendant was at all times pertinent to this action employed by or otherwise in the service of The Archdiocese of Boston.

#### FACTS

- 4. In 1978, Plaintiff and his family resided in and were members of the congregation of Saint Joseph's Church in Quincy, Massachusetts when Defendant was assigned to Saint Joseph's Church as Associate Pastor. Plaintiff, who was twelve years old at the time, was already serving as an alter boy at Saint Joseph's Church at the time of Defendant's assignment.
- 5. From the time of Defendant's assignment to Saint Joseph's Church in 1978, Defendant showed a special interest in Plaintiff upon which Plaintiff's parents looked approvingly. For instance, Defendant selected Plaintiff be the lead singer in the Christmas Holiday Concert that year, which concert never occurred for reasons unrelated to this action.
- 6. In December 1978, Plaintiff's family moved to a different part of Quincy, Massachusetts within a different parish of the Roman Catholic Church. However, Plaintiff and his family continued to be affiliated with Saint Joseph's Church, where Plaintiff attended mass and religious education classes.
- 7. In February 1979, Defendant invited Plaintiff and his older brother to go on a camping trip with him to New Hampshire during school vacation. Again, Plaintiff's parents looked approvingly upon the attention that Defendant was giving Plaintiff.
- 8. At the time of the camping trip, Plaintiff's brother became ill and could not attend. However, Plaintiff went with Defendant on the camping trip alone.
- 9. Defendant took Plaintiff to Camp Fatima in Gilmanton Iron Works, New Hampshire, a camp for mentally retarded and developmentally disabled children owned by the Diocese of Manchester but frequented by Boston clergy.

- 10. Claiming that he forgot to bring his keys to the camp, Defendant broke into a cabin with Plaintiff. After breaking in, Defendant tried to get heat going, but after a period of time he decided to leave with Plaintiff and go to his sister's apartment in Manchester, New Hampshire.
- 11. Upon arriving his sister's apartment at Manchester, New Hampshire, Defendant and Plaintiff visited with Defendant's sister and watched television. As the day was progressing, Plaintiff began feeling ill.
- 12. Later that evening, when it was time for bed, Defendant informed Plaintiff that they had to sleep together in a pull-out couch. Defendant undressed to his t-shirt and underwear. Perhaps sensing Plaintiff's apprehension, Defendant said to Plaintiff, "Don't worry. What do you think I am, gay?" Plaintiff said nothing in response.
- 13. During the evening, while Plaintiff and Defendant were in bed together, Defendant pulled Plaintiff close to him and sodomized him. Plaintiff has remembered not being able to move, of feeling mentally and physically paralyzed.
- 14. On the morning following the sexual molestation, Plaintiff remembers getting dressed quickly and leaving the room in a hurry. Plaintiff recalls there being little conversation between Plaintiff and Defendant during the return ride home to Massachusetts. Plaintiff's predominant memory of the car ride home is of sitting in the front passenger seat feeling ill and leaning against the door.
- 15. Upon returning home, Plaintiff's parents put him in bed immediately because of his illness. Later that day, while Plaintiff was in bed, Plaintiff's parents sent Plaintiff's brother into to ask him if anything had happened during the trip with Defendant. Plaintiff denied on that occasion that anything had happened. Later that same day, Plaintiff's mother checked Plaintiff's underpants and found that they were soiled with blood and a strange liquid.
- 16. Plaintiff has remembered that his anus hurt him after the sexual molestation and that he had recurrent hemorrhoid problems for several years thereafter.
- 17. Upon information and belief, which information Plaintiff believes to be true, Defendant has always resided and been employed outside the State of New Hampshire since the incident giving rise to this action.

- 18. Until late 1993, Plaintiff had repressed the memory of having been sodomized by Defendant. The occasion for Plaintiff remembering Defendant's sexual molestation of him in February 1979 was media publicity about the Father James Porter cases in Massachusetts and a request in February 1994 by Cardinal Law of the Archdiocese of Boston for victims of clergy sexual molestation to come forward and report the incidents.
- 19. Only as a result of Plaintiff remembering in late 1993 and early 1994 Defendant's sexual molestation of him in February 1979 has Plaintiff been able to know and understand that Defendant's sexual molestation of him in 1979 was an injury sufficient to apprise him that his rights may have been violated. Further, only as a result of Plaintiff remembering in late 1993 and early 1994 that Defendant sexually molested him in 1979, did Plaintiff discover all of the elements necessary to constitute the claims he has against Defendant.

#### COUNT I - ASSAULT AND BATTERY

- 20. The allegations in contained in Paragraph 1 19 are hereby incorporated by reference.
- 21. Defendant intentionally, willfully, or recklessly, and without privilege, committed harmful and offensive sexual contact with Plaintiff. As a result of said sexual abuse, Plaintiff was damaged and caused to suffer past, present and future psychological and emotional injury.

#### COUNT II - INTENTIONAL INFLICTION OF EMOTIONAL DISTRESS

- 22. The allegations contained in Paragraph 1 21 above are hereby incorporated by reference.
- 23. Defendant intentionally, willfully, or recklessly engaged in extreme and outrageous conduct toward Plaintiff by sexually molesting Plaintiff, thereby causing past, present and future psychological and emotional injury.

#### COUNT III - FALSE IMPRISONMENT

- 24. The allegations contained in Paragraphs 1-23 above are hereby incorporated by reference.
- 25. Defendant intentionally, willfully, or recklessly, and without privilege, restrained the freedom of Plaintiff and imprisoned Plaintiff for the purpose of Defendant's sexual gratification.

#### COUNT IV - FRAUD

26. The allegations contained in Paragraphs 1 - 25 above are hereby incorporated by reference.

27. Defendant intentionally, willfully, or recklessly made certain misrepresentations of material facts to Plaintiff concerning the reasons why Plaintiff should befriend Defendant, for the purpose of inducing Plaintiff's reliance and emotional dependence upon Defendant. As a direct result of said misrepresentations to Plaintiff, Defendant has caused past, present and future severe psychological and emotional injury to Plaintiff.

#### COUNT V - NEGLIGENCE

- 28. The allegations contained in Paragraphs 1 27 above are hereby incorporated by reference.
- 29. At all times material to this action, Defendant had a duty to use reasonable care in his relationship with Plaintiff to act in a manner which would not create foreseeable and unreasonable risk of harm to Plaintiff, who was then a minor child, and to obey the laws of the State of New Hampshire, including RSA 639:3 (Endangering the Welfare of a Child).
- 30. Defendant breached his statutory and common law duties to Plaintiff by engaging in sexual contact with Plaintiff.
- 31. Defendant's conduct in breach of said duties directly and proximately caused Plaintiff to suffer past, present and future severe psychological and emotional injury.

### COUNT VI - NEGLIGENT INFLICTION OF EMOTIONAL DISTRESS

- 32. The allegations contained in Paragraphs  $1\,-\,31$  above are hereby incorporated by reference.
- 33. At all times material to this action, Defendant owed a duty to use reasonable care in his relationship with Plaintiff to refrain from conduct which would inflict psychological and emotional harm upon Plaintiff.
- 34. Defendant breached his duty of reasonable care to Plaintiff by engaging in unreasonable and extreme conduct that would cause emotional and psychological harm to Plaintiff.
- 35. Defendant's negligent conduct directly and proximately caused Plaintiff to suffer past, present and future severe psychological and emotional harm.

#### COUNT VII - BREACH OF FIDUCIARY DUTY

36. The allegations contained in Paragraphs 1 - 35 above are hereby incorporated by reference.

- 37. At all times material to this action, Defendant, acting as a representative of the Roman Catholic Church, owed a duty of due care toward Plaintiff to act as a moral person, to behave in a selfless fashion and to act in an accordance with the special confidence, trust and loyalty placed in him by Plaintiff.
- 38. Defendant breached his special duty to Plaintiff by engaging in forced anal intercourse with Plaintiff.
- 39. Defendant's conduct in breach of his special duty to Plaintiff directly and proximately caused Plaintiff to suffer past, present and future severe psychological and emotional injury.
- 40. In addition to the foregoing damages, Defendant has caused Plaintiff, in all Counts above, to sustain a loss of enjoyment of life.




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

Thank you for your letter of October 2, 1995. My client, has authorized me to write to you to give a more complete explication or his claim against Reverend Robert V. Gale and the Archdiocese of Boston.

, who is currently twenty-nine years old and residing on the South Shore of Massachusetts, was sodomized by Father Gale in Father Gale's sister's apartment in Manchester, New Hampshire in y grew up in Quincy, Massachusetts and February, 1979. came to know Father Gale at Saint Joseph's Church in Quincy, where my client was an alter boy. My client came to know Father Gale not only through my client's religious duties, but also because of Father Gale's contact with his family. In February 1979, Father Gale invited my client, who was twelve years old at the time, and his brother to go on a camping trip with him to New Hampshire during school vacation. My client's brother got sick, however, and s parents looked could not attend. At this time, favorably upon the fact that Father Gale was taking a special interest in their son.

The circumstances as to what happened in New Hampshire are curious indeed. My client relates that Father Gale drove him to Camp Fatima in Gilmanton, Iron Works, New Hampshire, a camp for mentally retarded and developmentally disabled children owned the Diocese of Manchester, but frequented by Boston clergy. Father Gale apparently did not have any keys to the camp, so he broke into

My client has tracked down, with the assistance of a private investigator, the location of Father Gale's sister's apartment. Indeed, my client was inside the apartment earlier this year and confirms that as being the location where he was sexually molested. At Father Gale's sister's apartment, they watched had developed. At Father Gale's sister's apartment, they watched t.v. for a while, and when it was time for bed, Father Gale told my client that they had to sleep together in a pull-out couch. Father Gale stripped down to his t-shirt and underwear and, perhaps sensing that my client was apprehensive, said to him, "Don't worry. What do you think I am, gay?" My client said nothing.

Until one and one-half years ago, that was all my client remembered. Since then, he has remembered that when they were in bed together, Father Gale pulled my client close to him and sodomized him. My client states that his strongest memory was of not being able to move, of feeling mentally and physically not being able to move, of feeling mentally and physically paralyzed. In the morning, my client remembers getting dressed and leaving the room in a hurry. His predominant memory of the car ride home is sitting in the front passenger seat and leaning against the door.

When Father Gale brought my client home, his parents put him in bed because he was sick. During the past year, my client has recalled that his parents had suspicions that something had happened to him overnight, because they sent my client's older brother in to ask him if anything had happened. My client denied at that time that anything had happened. My client recalls that his mother checked his underpants and found that they were soiled with blood and a strange liquid. As a result of running a personal ad in a newspaper in the Quincy, Massachusetts area, I have been contacted by at least two other victims of Father Gale. One of the victims was sexually molested in New Hampshire as well, within one year after my client's molestation. The other victim was sexually molested by Father Gale shortly before and shortly after he molested for this victim is known to the Archdiocese of Boston, and it was his sexual molestation shortly after that led to Father Gale being quickly transferred by the Archdiocese of Boston from Gale being quickly transferred by the Archdiocese of Boston from Saint Joseph's Church in Quincy to Saint Jude Church in Waltham.

As mentioned before, repressed many of the excrutiatingly painful details of his sexual molestation until late 1993 or early 1994, in the wake of publicity of the Father Porter cases and the request of Cardinal Law in February, 1994 for victims of clergy sexual molestation to come forward.

My client's teenage years were checkered as a result of his sexual molestation. Immediately after the sexual molestation, began drinking alcohol excessively; he specifically recalls coming home one Easter night drunk. also reports that he experienced extremely low self-esteem throughout his teenage years, despite having reason otherwise to feel good about himself due to academic and athletic successes.

credit, he has married, has two children and has established a respectable employment record. However, his external successes cover up his interior condition.

At this time, Note by has authorized me to request that the Archdiocese of Boston make a formal settlement offer to him. Pursuant to your letter of October 2, 1995, we will approach Father Gale directly with respect to civil claims against him. However, I would request receiving a written settlement offer from you on behalf of the Archdioceses of Boston within the next thirty (30) days.

- 2. Defendant, Reverend Robert V. Gale, is a resident of Milton, Massachusetts.
- 3. Defendant was at all times pertinent to this action employed by or otherwise in the service of The Archdiocese of Boston.

#### **FACTS**

- 4. In 1978, Plaintiff and his family resided in Quincy, Massachusetts and were members of the congregation of Saint Joseph's Church in Quincy, Massachusetts when Defendant was assigned to Saint Joseph's Church as Associate Pastor. Plaintiff, who was twelve years old at the time, was already serving as an alter boy at Saint Joseph's Church at the time of Defendant's assignment.
- 5. From the time of Defendant's assignment to Saint Joseph's Church in 1978, Defendant showed a special interest in Plaintiff upon which Plaintiff's parents looked approvingly. For instance, Defendant selected Plaintiff be the lead singer in the Christmas Holiday Concert that year, which concert never occurred for reasons unrelated to this action.
- 6. In December 1978, Plaintiff's family moved to a different part of Quincy, Massachusetts within a different parish of the Roman Catholic Church. However, Plaintiff and his family continued to be affiliated with Saint Joseph's Church, where Plaintiff attended mass and religious education classes.
- 7. In February 1979, Defendant invited Plaintiff and his older brother to go on a camping trip with him to New Hampshire during school vacation. Again, Plaintiff's parents looked approvingly upon the attention that Defendant was giving Plaintiff.
- 8. At the time of the camping trip, Plaintiff's brother became ill and could not attend. However, Plaintiff went with Defendant on the camping trip alone.
- 9. Defendant took Plaintiff to Camp Fatima in Gilmanton Iron Works, New Hampshire, a camp for mentally retarded and developmentally disabled children owned by the Diocese of Manchester but frequented by Boston clergy.

- 10. Claiming that he forgot to bring his keys to the camp, Defendant broke into a cabin with Plaintiff. After breaking in, Defendant tried to get heat going, but after a period of time he decided to leave with Plaintiff and go to his sister's apartment in Manchester, New Hampshire.
- 11. Upon arriving his sister's apartment at Manchester, New Hampshire, Defendant and Plaintiff visited with Defendant's sister and watched television. As the day was progressing, Plaintiff began feeling ill.
- 12. Later that evening, when it was time for bed, Defendant informed Plaintiff that they had to sleep together in a pull-out couch. Defendant undressed to his t-shirt and underwear. Perhaps sensing Plaintiff's apprehension, Defendant said to Plaintiff, "Don't worry. What do you think I am, gay?" Plaintiff said nothing in response.
- 13. During the evening, while Plaintiff and Defendant were in bed together, Defendant pulled Plaintiff close to him and sodomized him. Plaintiff has remembered not being able to move, of feeling mentally and physically paralyzed.
- 14. On the morning following the sexual molestation, Plaintiff remembers getting dressed quickly and leaving the room in a hurry. Plaintiff recalls there being little conversation between Plaintiff and Defendant during the return ride home to Massachusetts. Plaintiff's predominant memory of the car ride home is of sitting in the front passenger seat feeling ill and leaning against the door.
- 15. Upon returning home, Plaintiff's parents put him in bed immediately because of his illness. Later that day, while Plaintiff was in bed, Plaintiff's parents sent Plaintiff's brother into to ask him if anything had happened during the trip with Defendant. Plaintiff denied on that occasion that anything had happened. Later that same day, Plaintiff's mother checked Plaintiff's underpants and found that they were soiled with blood and a strange liquid.
- 16. Plaintiff has remembered that his anus hurt him after the sexual molestation and that he had recurrent hemorrhoid problems for several years thereafter.
- 17. Upon information and belief, which information Plaintiff believes to be true, Defendant has always resided and been employed outside the State of New Hampshire since the incident giving rise to this action.

- 18. Until late 1993, Plaintiff had repressed the memory of having been sodomized by Defendant. The occasion for Plaintiff remembering Defendant's sexual molestation of him in February 1979 was media publicity about the Father James Porter cases in Massachusetts and a request in February 1994 by Cardinal Law of the Archdiocese of Boston for victims of clergy sexual molestation to come forward and report the incidents.
- 19. Only as a result of Plaintiff remembering in late 1993 and early 1994 Defendant's sexual molestation of him in February 1979 has Plaintiff been able to know and understand that Defendant's sexual molestation of him in 1979 was an injury sufficient to apprise him that his rights may have been violated. Further, only as a result of Plaintiff remembering in late 1993 and early 1994 that Defendant sexually molested him in 1979, did Plaintiff discover all of the elements necessary to constitute the claims he has against Defendant.

## COUNT I - ASSAULT AND BATTERY

- 20. The allegations in contained in Paragraph 1 19 are hereby incorporated by reference.
- 21. Defendant intentionally, willfully, or recklessly, and without privilege, committed harmful and offensive sexual contact with plaintiff. As a result of said sexual abuse, Plaintiff was damaged and caused to suffer past, present and future psychological and emotional injury.

# COUNT II - INTENTIONAL INFLICTION OF EMOTIONAL DISTRESS

- 22. The allegations contained in Paragraph 1 21 above are hereby incorporated by reference.
- 23. Defendant intentionally, willfully, or recklessly engaged in extreme and outrageous conduct toward Plaintiff by sexually molesting Plaintiff, thereby causing past, present and future psychological and emotional injury.

### COUNT III - FALSE IMPRISONMENT

- 24. The allegations contained in Paragraphs 1-23 above are hereby incorporated by reference.
- 25. Defendant intentionally, willfully, or recklessly, and without privilege, restrained the freedom of Plaintiff and imprisoned Plaintiff for the purpose of Defendant's sexual gratification.

### COUNT IV - FRAUD

26. The allegations contained in Paragraphs  $1\,$  -  $25\,$  above are hereby incorporated by reference.

27. Defendant intentionally, willfully, or recklessly made certain misrepresentations of material facts to Plaintiff concerning the reasons why Plaintiff should befriend Defendant, for the purpose of inducing Plaintiff's reliance and emotional dependence upon Defendant. As a direct result of said misrepresentations to Plaintiff, Defendant has caused past, present and future severe psychological and emotional injury to Plaintiff.

### COUNT V - NEGLIGENCE

- 28. The allegations contained in Paragraphs 1 27 above are hereby incorporated by reference.
- 29. At all times material to this action, Defendant had a duty to use reasonable care in his relationship with Plaintiff to act in a manner which would not create foreseeable and unreasonable risk of harm to Plaintiff, who was then a minor child, and to obey the laws of the State of New Hampshire, including RSA 639:3 (Endangering the Welfare of a Child).
- 30. Defendant breached his statutory and common law duties to Plaintiff by engaging in sexual contact with Plaintiff.
- 31. Defendant's conduct in breach of said duties directly and proximately caused Plaintiff to suffer past, present and future severe psychological and emotional injury.

# COUNT VI - NEGLIGENT INFLICTION OF EMOTIONAL DISTRESS

- 32. The allegations contained in Paragraphs 1 31 above are hereby incorporated by reference.
- 33. At all times material to this action, Defendant owed a duty to use reasonable care in his relationship with Plaintiff to refrain from conduct which would inflict psychological and emotional harm upon Plaintiff.
- 34. Defendant breached his duty of reasonable care to Plaintiff by engaging in unreasonable and extreme conduct that would cause emotional and psychological harm to Plaintiff.
- 35. Defendant's negligent conduct directly and proximately caused Plaintiff to suffer past, present and future severe psychological and emotional harm.

### COUNT VII - BREACH OF FIDUCIARY DUTY

36. The allegations contained in Paragraphs 1 - 35 above are hereby incorporated by reference.

- 37. At all times material to this action, Defendant, acting as a representative of the Roman Catholic Church, owed a duty of due care toward Plaintiff to act as a moral person, to behave in a selfless fashion and to act in an accordance with the special confidence, trust and loyalty placed in him by Plaintiff.
- 38. Defendant breached his special duty to Plaintiff by engaging in forced anal intercourse with Plaintiff.
- 39. Defendant's conduct in breach of his special duty to Plaintiff directly and proximately caused Plaintiff to suffer past, present and future severe psychological and emotional injury.
- 40. In addition to the foregoing damages, Defendant has caused Plaintiff, in all Counts above, to sustain a loss of enjoyment of life.



initially met with Fr. Charles Higgins who in turn referred him to CEM. Fr. Higgins described as a very well balanced twenty-six year old father of two. is employed at

wife what happened to him at the age of twelve.

y met with CEM on Tuesday, February 8. He said that the Porter incident and more recently the Cardinal's letter moved him to unburden his own incident with Fr. Robert Gale while the priest was stationed at St. Joseph's, Quincy Point. He began by saying that it was known that Fr. Gale had approached a kid in the rectory and others, and that the fathers of the boys "ran him out of town". His own father was among them although had not told his parents.

In 1978-79 when was 12 years old, his family had moved to North Quincy, but continued to attend St. Joseph's for Mass, CCD, etc. was an altar boy who felt Fr. Gale took a special interest in him and who worked with him on a singing part for a later cancelled parish show - all now seen as a set up. During the February, 1979 school vacation week, Fr. Gale invited to go camping at Camp Fatima. They had a hard time getting into one of the buildings and then could not get the heat to work. They then went to Fr. Gale's sister's home. did not know where this was and by this time he was not feeling well and had developed a fever. He remembers that the sister had a room upstairs and that he and Fr. Gale used a pull-out couch in the living room. When he appeared uncomfortable about sharing the bed, Fr. Gale said, "what do you think - that I'm gay?" He is not sure what went on (CEM asked if there were any advances); he knows he was feverish and knows that he felt terrible and that he was bleeding rectally the next morning.

When returned home, he remembers that his mother and a visiting aunt took care of him. He had a 104 fever and they thought the bleeding was connected to the high fever. expressed some bitterness that these adults did not recognize what happened. When CEM asked if his parents knew about the incident,

thought that they might know, his mother having said at some time, "we know the problems that can happen." He never told them, but did tell two friends. "I trusted no one" and "I went through the motions about church".

feels that in sharing this he will receive support from his family. He felt that his interview provided an opportunity to know that he is not "crazy" and that he is a credible person. Since now lives in Rockland, CEM gave him two counseling agencies on the South Shore as references. She also shared that Fr. Gale's ministry is restricted and that with spermission the incident would be made known to Fr. Gale.

Sister Pauline Lebel, Secretary for Christian Formation, spoke with me on Thursday, 7 March 2002 regarding a discussion that she had with Mike French who serves as the Resident Director for E. C. Week. She asked me to contact Mr. French, which I did by telephone that evening.

When I spoke with Mr. French, he shared with me that the report which he had was not first hand and at this time was from a source he deemed to be reliable but which he could not reveal. He indicated that this person with whom he spoke had direct knowledge that a report was made to the Archdiocese of Boston approximately ten years ago regarding an allegation of sexual misconduct by Robert Gale that occurred approximately twelve to fifteen years ago. Although he did not have the details of the allegation, Mike indicated that Robert Gale assaulted a minor at Camp Fatima after the regular season E.C. Week had concluded.

Mike French and I agreed that he would corroborate the information, which he had received, and ask the person to contact my office directly so that I could facilitate a report to the Archdiocese of Boston and/or a report to the appropriate parties here in New Hampshire.

Sister Pauline Lebel, the Secretary for Christian Formation of the Diocese of Manchester, recently shared with me a copy of the letter sent to her and a number of other people, including yourself, from Father David O'Leary, the resident director of Exceptional Children Week at Camp Fatima, here in the Diocese of Manchester. I simply wanted to inform you that if we, in the Diocese of Manchester, can be of any assistance to you in regard to the allegations that have been raised about Father Robert Gale, please free to be in touch with me.

I would hasten to add one piece of information that might be important to you. The current director of the camp, Mr. Gus Planchette, who I understand has been friendly with Father Gale over the years, has made clear to Father Gale that because of his problem in the past, it would be better if he did not take part in any of the activities of the camp, including Exceptional Weekend, now or in the future. Father Gale apparently was understanding of this request, and stated openly to Mr. Planchette that while he did have a problem in this area many years ago, he has not experienced any difficulty for a long period of time. This may, in fact, be true. However, the allegation in the last paragraph on page 1 of Father O'Leary's letter would seem to indicate that his statement concerning his sobriety in this area may be inaccurate.

In any case, please let me know if there is anything that we can do for you in this regard.

Week, but felt very reluctant to tell & address the issue myself. Jim McCarthy assured me Fr. Gale would not be coming to E. C. Week. Applications sent out and returns come back. Fr. Bob Gale has sent in an application for E.C. Week '93. I call Jim McCarthy to voice my surprise at the application. Jim McCarthy assures me Bob Gale will call to withdraw the application. A few weeks later at an area clergy meeting Bob Gale asks me when the acceptance letters are coming out for E.C. Week and that he will be bringing up some chowder for the closing night and stopping up to see the cook during regular season to have everything ready.

Once again I called Jim McCarty and inform him of this information. Jim assures me that Bob Gale will be withdrawing his application. June is the time letters of acceptance are sent out to volunteers. I went up to camp and had Fr. Gale's name removed from the computer, which would mean he would not be getting a letter of acceptance for E.C. Week '93 or any other E.C. Week mailings. At this time I had a private meeting with Gus Planchet, the diocesan director of Camp Fatima & Camp Bernadette for Manchester. I shared with him this information and said Fr. Gale will not becoming to E.C. Week '93. I also warned him that Fr. Gale should not be let into camp during regular season.

This letter is to document all the information that has come to me in order to protect E.C. Week. I regret that I did not take stronger or quicker action.


